## KEYNOTE ADDRESS:

### *“Listening to the Voice of the Patient”*

**Robert Potter, M.D., Ph.D.**

The patient is a person with a problem. There is both a medical and moral part to every patient's problem. Listening to the patient allows the health care provider to hear the moral suffering. Whether as a provider or a patient, each of us must engage in a dialogue that reveals the moral suffering in order to make the clinical encounter complete. How to understand the patient as a person and not as a disease diagnosis, to speak to, listen to, and interpret suffering are the themes of this keynote.

*Dr. Robert Potter's professional life combined medical practice, teaching, and bioethics consultation. He practiced internal medicine and geriatrics for 30 years while teaching for the University of Kansas School of Medicine. Robert also holds a Ph.D. in religion, psychology, and ethics from the University of Chicago Divinity School. For 10 years he was a bioethics scholar, instructor, and consultant for Midwest Bioethics Center in Kansas City, Missouri. He is now retired and lives in Portland, Oregon and is director of ethics education for OHSU.*
